CLAYTON BILL SIGNED.

President Approves Measure Completing Anti-Trust Programme.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—President Wilson today signed the Clayton Anti-Trust bill, thus completing the Administration's trust programme. There were no ceremonies connected with the signing of the bill.

The Chicago Association of Commerce, in a telegram to President Wilson, to-day approved the Anti-Trust and Trade Commission bills.

"We believe that in the administration of these laws the opportunity afforded for a prompt hearing upon complaint will result in the speedy suppression of evil practices and in the promotion of honest business," the message said.

While railway securities legislation probably will be deferred until the next Congress, because no conclusion on the form of it has been reached and because President Wilson believes there is no pressing demand for it now, Mr. Wilson told callers today the question was still an open one.
