TEN ANARCHISTS HELD.

Emma Goldman the Only One to Get Ball—Says Police Beat Her.

Emma Goldman, with ten other Anarchists, half of whom were women, were taken to the Yorkville Court yesterday. They were arrested on Tuesday night at a memorial meeting to Czolgosz, President McKinley's assassin.

All of the prisoners were held in \$1,000 bail for examination to-day, including Morris Berkowitz of 637 Fifth Street, who, as proof of his safe and sane tendencies, asserted that if he didn't go to jail he was going to vote for Hughes. Despite the logic of his contention he was held with the others.

Emma Goldman told Magistrate Cornell that the object of the meeting had been to protest against the arrest last week of her associate Edelson. The police had beaten the woman with clubs, she said, and one of them had threatened to throw her down a flight of stairs. She alone of the prisoners succeeded in getting ball David Roussea of 310 Mott Avenue pledged his electrical factory in the Bronx to get her out.

The prisoners were represented in court by Bolton Hall, who said he appeared at the request of Hugh O. Pentecost. When the prisoners were led to the cells the mother of one of the women, Annie Pastor, fainted. She was revived, but again became unconscious. She revived later and went home.

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
