FAVOR SUNDAY RADIO JAZZ.

Auditors Write to Broadcaster Who Had Read a Protest.

Radio auditors are not opposed to the broadcasting of jazz programs on Sunday, according to a flood of letters received yesterday by Milton M. Roemer, as the result of a complaint made over Station WMCA on Sunday night by John H. Maynor, secretary of the Keep-the-Air-Clean-Sunday Society.

Mr. Maynor contended that popular music on Sundays is "degrading" and "defaming." He wrote to Mr. Roemer, who is the manager of a troupe which broadcasts over WMCA on Sundays from 6 to 7 o'clock. The letters yesterday came as the result of the reading of the protest by Mr. Roemer

on Sunday night.

"The majority of the letters came from radio fans who said they were churchgoers and that they listen to religious music and sermons on Sunday, but that they see no reason why jazz should not be played," said Mr. Roemer. "The letters as a whole express the conviction that the air should be entirely free, and that any one can tune in that which they desire, be it jazz, classic or anthem."

Arthur Batchelor, Federal Radio Inspector for this district, said he had no power whatever to regulate the situation, nor censor an air program, but that the incident would be called to the attention of the new Federal

Radio Commission.

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
